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PROGRAM DESCRIPTION:

A road safety assembly brings students from different grade levels to a common area to share messages of road safety. A road safety assembly is an effective way to engage students in a school-wide program or initiative. An assembly might focus on bike safety, pedestrian skills, safety programs like Trailblazers, or upcoming active transportation initiatives like Winter Walk Day.

PURPOSE:

This SOP will describe the process an administrator would follow to host a safety assembly at an individual school, to list tools available at STSWR to support this process, and to describe the outcomes a school can expect upon completion of this initiative.

DEFINITIONS:

Road safety: Any safety messaging that will help our students stay safer on the streets. This could include; bike safety, pedestrian skills, and road/traffic safety overall.

Road safety specialists: People with some expertise who can speak to students about the importance of safety on the journey to school and when navigating their communities including; Crossing Guard Supervisors, Student Resource Officers, Bylaw Officers, STP Facilitators, traffic specialists, cycling safety instructors, pedestrian skill instructors, and municipal transportation staff.

Road safety activities: Songs, dances, pledges, or puzzles for students to participate in during active parts of the assembly.

Assembly themes: Cycling safety (bike helmet fittings, cycling hand signs); pedestrian safety (roundabouts, wayfinding, pedestrian crossovers, biohazard, stranger assessments, how to pack a backpack); winter walking (winter wear fashion show, how to walk on slippery surfaces, visibility); events (iWalk Day, Winter Walk Day, a Walk in their Sneakers); safety patrol recruitment (Trailblazers, Standing Foot Patrol, Bus Patrol); changes to arrival and dismissal (school-made video, anti-idling, drive-to-5, bike and scooter rack usage or rules).

PROCESS:

In order to take part, a school Administrator must:

- 1. Work with an STP Facilitator to identify an assembly theme defining the area of improvement that needs student attention.
- 2. Determine assembly schedule, date, and time.
- Determine short list of road safety specialists who could speak and safety
 activities to repeat with students. Note to scheduler: keep presentations to 20
 minutes in total, with movement activities in between 5-minute presentations to
 optimize student attention.
- 4. Determine if student presenters would enhance the assembly, and recruit those students through teachers.
- 5. Recruit staff or parent help as needed.
- 6. Confirm speaker list.
- 7. Ask teachers to promote assembly with classrooms.
- 8. Promote with parents.

SAFETY AND SUCCESS PROVISIONS

- Working with students and clubs to determine their greatest area of interest within active transportation will help create a theme that speaks to the student body. Perhaps a club is working on a specific initiative that can be the focus of the assembly.
- 2. STSWR can help connect the school to potential speakers in the community. School council is a great resource for finding people who are willing to deliver a talk or demonstration at the assembly.

EXPECTED RESULTS

- Increased level of student safety knowledge regarding specific road safety issues troubling the school.
- Demonstration of the school's commitment to safety and to active transportation.
- An opportunity to involve students in planning and presenting on topics that they are working on in clubs or in their classroom.
- Increased discussions at home regarding road safety at the school.
- Increased parent confidence in their child's level of knowledge around active transportation and safety.
